Professor John Tomaney Place-based Approaches to Regional Development



John Tomaney is Professor of Regional Development and Director of the Centre for Urban and Regional Development Studies (CURDS), Newcastle University; Professor of Regional Studies at Monash University, Melbourne; Associate Director of the UK Spatial Economics Research Centre (SERC) and is an Academician of the Academy of Social Science (UK). Previous roles include the University of Melbourne, the University of Oxford, the Victorian Department of Premier and Cabinet, consulting firm McKinsey and Co, and most recently ANZ. 
Professor Caroline Saunders Regional Development Before and After an Earthquake



Caroline Saunders is Professor of Trade and Environment and Director of the AERU at Lincoln University, New Zealand (www.lincoln.ac.nz/aeru). She has over 100 publications specialising on sustainable economic development and was awarded the NZIER Economics Prize in 2007. She was the lead author of the Canterbury Regional Economic Development Strategy (CREDS) in September 2009, twelve months before a series of three devastating earthquakes destroyed large parts of the central business district of the region's largest city, Christchurch. Caroline will speak on this experience.

Professor Bob Stimson *Introduction to AURIN*

Professor Bob Stimson is Director, Australian Urban Research Infrastructure Network (AURIN), University of Melbourne and Professor Emeritus at the University of Queensland. He is an analytical human geographer and regional scientist, specialising in urban and regional analysis, development and planning and research into human spatial behaviour. Bob was elected a Fellow of the Regional Science Association International in 2010. Professor Stimson will make a presentation on the AURIN project and the e-research capability it is building.



Richard Walker Regional Development: Comments



Richard Walker is Chief Executive Officer of Economic Development Australia. A geologist by profession, he switched careers two decades ago when he was appointed Business Manager for Unisearch Ltd, a six-year stepping stone for his subsequent role as Executive Director of Macquarie Research Limited overseeing annually more than 400 research, consulting and training projects with an annual turnover of \$12 million. From 2004 to 2006 he managed a major sustainability project at the Warren Centre for Advanced Engineering. Richard will provide comments on the two presentations by John Tomaney and John Daley.
