# ANZRSAI Conference 2006 Introducing Beechworth Victoria

### Beechworth 26 – 29 September

## Theme: Heritage and Regional Development

The place of natural, built and cultural heritage in Australian society is now regarded as a major driver of regional development in cities and towns across the nation. Both Australian and international visitors are drawn to the heritage of place to satisfy their curiosity about how these places came to be; who were the people involved, what industry did they develop, how did they impact their environment and what legacy did they leave for us to experience today?

At the 2006 ANZRSAI conference to be held at La Trobe University's heritage campus in the historic town of Beechworth in the beautiful natural landscape of north eastern Victoria we will explore the role of heritage in regional development, along with the other regional development interests shared by regional development practitioners, consultants and academics.

With key note addresses from innovators in heritage and regional development, government ministers, senior government officials and others with an interest in the place of heritage in Australian society the conference will provide practical insights to any place which claims natural, built or cultural heritage as a part of their regional development.



### The Location



Beechworth is located 320 kilometres north east of Melbourne and 40 kilometres south of Albury-Wodonga. The population at the time of the 2001 Census was 2,800.

The town has experienced many changes in recent decades. From the economic restructuring, high unemployment and out-migration of the early 1990s, the town has been revitalised by tourism and other development. It now attracts high numbers of weekend and holiday visitors as well as being a popular retirement destination.

## CLUSTERS PACIFI

### Clusters Asia Pacific - www.capinc.com.au

The mission of Clusters Asia Pacific (CAP) is "to improve the competitiveness of industries and localities within Australia and New Zealand by enhancing cluster-based development initiatives."

The website has a range of resources which may be of interest to ANZRSAI members. For those unfamiliar with the concept of industry clusters, the website includes a useful introduction. Monthly newsletters can be down loaded from the site and the following hardcopy reports can be purchased via the website:

Innovation & the Knowledge Economy (AUD\$30.00) outlines how the City of Playford, in northern Adelaide, is developing local solutions to addressing issues of globalisation. The report includes case studies on best practice supply chain management, entrepreneurship, clusters, cities and a practical guide to building business networks, by national and international experts.

Clusters, Innovation & Investment (AUD\$22.00) reports on the latest developments and thinking on industry clustering from around the world. This book is relevant to policymakers, industry practitioners, businesses and research agencies. Topics include: the importance of clusters; Scottish approaches; 'Linking Clusters' initiative and overview of Aust.-New Zealand clusters.

Food for Thought (AUD \$22.00) was prepared by Rod Brown of Australian Projects Development and Rodin Genoff from the City of Playford. The project covered a region from Northern Adelaide into the Barossa, Clare Valley, Adelaide Hills and Riverland. After interviewing over 100 companies and stakeholders 24 action agendas were developed covering environmental management, economic infrastructure, market development and industry development. The report concludes with a chapter on innovation. The authors found that most innovation undertaken by small to medium sized enterprises is incremental in nature.

# **ANZRSAI** membership goes global

## The RSAI

The Regional Science Association International (RSAI) is an international community of people interested in the regional impacts



of economic and social change. It serves as an umbrella organisation for three major organizations in North America, Europe and the Pacific and these in turn contain country-specific organisations such as ANZRSAI.

The current President of RSAI is Bob Stimson from the University of Queensland (refer March 2005 edition of the ANZRSAI Newsletter for more on Bob). He has been involved in the development of universal membership arrangements for ANZRSAI members which will come into effect from 2006. The benefits to members of these new arrangments are outlined below by Bob.

## **Benefits of RSAI universal membership**

Under the new arrangements, members of ANZRSAI become integrated into an international community of over 3,500 regional scientists and can participate in the three supra-regional organizations of RSAI - the pacific region (PRSCO), the North American region (NARSC), and the European region (ERSA). There are in excess of 30 country of regionally-specific sections of RSA that are incorporated within those supra-regional groupings, and new sections have recently been formed and are in the process of being nurtured in Latin America, Asia and Africa.

Through an arrangement with Blackwell Publishing, members of RSAI will receive from Blackwell an email with their PIN and when they activate that PIN they will have automatic assess on-line to articles in Papers in Regional Science and the RSAI Newsletter, and access to the RSAI Web Site.

On-line access will also be available to an expanding array of RSAI services which are currently being developed or planned. This will include a new international journal that focuses specifically on policy and practice in regional science and regional development.

With the upgrading of the RSAI web Site, members will be able to link to the web sites across the international community of regional science organizations.

All this for an annual capitation fee of just 10 Euros built into your membership subscription to ANZRSAI.
