Professor Richard Shearmur The Geography of Innovation and Local Development



Richard Shearmur is Professor in the School of Urban Planning at McGill University, Canada. His research interests are urban and regional economic development, geography of innovation, intra-metropolitan urban form, and issues of measurement and numbers. He was co-editor of *Knowledge Intensive Business Services: Geography and Innovation* published by Ashgate in 2010. Professor Shearmur's address is based on his research on innovation, its connection with local development, and the need to think of territories relationally.

Professor Graeme Hugo Population Dynamics in Regional Australia

Graeme Hugo is an ARC Australian Professorial Fellow, Professor of Geography and Director of the Australian Population and Migration Research Centre at the University of Adelaide, Australia. He is the author of over three hundred books, articles in scholarly journals and chapters in books. In 2012 he was named an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for distinguished service to population research. Professor Hugo will present his recent research on population dynamics in regional Australia and consider the implications for policy.



Professor Jacques Poot Economic Theories and Evidence on Regional Growth



Jacques Poot is Professor of Population Economics at the University of Waikato, New Zealand. He is a Correspondent (Honorary Fellow) of the Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences and an External Research Fellow of the Centre for Research and Analysis of Migration (CReAM) in London. He received the 2013 NZIER Economics Award. His research interests include the economics and geographical dimensions of population. Professor Poot is Editor of the "Growth" section in Springer's *Handbook of Regional Science* launched at the end of August 2013; his address is a review of that section.

Jack Archer and Vanessa Barnett Regional Development Research and Policy





Jack Archer leads the Institute's research program and policy development work, building on previous work on major regional reforms related to water, climate change and industry development. Vanessa Barnett leads



the Institute's Policy Program; her background is in urban and regional planning, sociology, policy, economics and project management.

Professor Bob Stimson Accessing Data through AURIN

Professor Bob Stimson is Director, Australian Urban Research Infrastructure Network (AURIN), University of Melbourne and Professor Emeritus at the University of Queensland. He is an analytical human geographer and regional scientist, specialising in urban and regional analysis, development and planning and research into human spatial behaviour. Professor Stimson is a Fellow of the Regional Science Association International and received its prestigious Hirotada Kohno Award in 2013. Professor Stimson's presentation is on how researchers can access data through the AURIN project he leads.



Ed Morrison Title to be confirmed



Ed Morrison is Regional Economic Development Advisor at the Center for Regional Development at Purdue University, USA. His research has been developing new, network-based models for economic and workforce development, which emphasize the strategic value of focused regional collaborations and open innovation in today's global economy. He was the first recipient of the Arthur D. Little Award for excellence in economic development presented by the American Economic Development Council.

Dr Paul Collits Is it "Regional"? Is it "Science"? What I have learned in twenty years of thinking about regional development

Paul Collits is an Associate Professor at the Fraser Coast campus of the University of Southern Queensland. He is also Research Director of the Economic Development and Enterprise Collaboration, leading its 'From Tired to Wired' project that focuses on entrepreneurship, business innovation, talent development and civic networks in the Wide Bay Burnett region. Dr Collits was elected President of ANZRSAI in December 2012; this is his Presidential Address.

Michael Carroll is Associate Professor of Economics and the Director of the Center for Regional Development and at Bowling Green State University. He is also Editor-in-Chief of *Regional Science Policy and Practice* published by RSAI. He is co-author of *Local Economic Development*, now in its second edition, published by Sage Publications. Professor Carroll is inviting four speakers with collaborative experience to articulate why regional science is useful to policymakers.
